Highlights

The Institute of Contemporary Arts honours Professor Homi K. Bhabha 30 September 2019

The Institute of Contemporary Arts will host a public lecture and Q&A with one of the world's most eminent figures in post-colonial studies, the Indian-English scholar and critical theorist, Professor Homi K. Bhabha. Bhabha's lecture will address 'The Language of Degradation' in contemporary politics. Following this public event, Bhabha will be honoured at the Institute of Contemporary Arts Annual Dinner on 30 September.

This is the third Annual Dinner, established in 2017 by ICA Director Stefan Kalmár, paying tribute to international public figures (Bryan Ferry in 2017, Chelsea Manning in 2018), aligning with the mission and work of the Institute.

Stefan Kalmár says: In a moment where we see a worldwide nationalistic backlash in response to the perceived threats of globalisation, Bhabha is a powerful reminder of the progressive possibilities that globalisation also holds. Bhabha's work has informed the thinking of generations of academics and artists. He developed a theory around the role of the 'Third Space', an in-between space in which new ideas can be formulated, something that the ICA, in its 73-year history, has always striven to be.

Professor Homi K. Bhabha is one of the most important figures in contemporary studies of colonial, postcolonial and globalisation studies. His key ideas of hybridity, ambivalence and mimicry have been formative for postcolonial theory, while inspiring work in art, literature, art theory, architecture and human rights, among other fields. Born in Mumbai in 1949, Bhabha is the Anne F. Rothenberg Professor of the Humanities and, for 14 years, the Director of the Mahindra Humanities Center at Harvard University; Senior Advisor on the Humanities to the President and Provost at Harvard; and recipient of the Padma Bhusan (full CV on request).

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Cameron Rowland

The Institute of Contemporary Arts presents the first solo exhibition in the UK by artist Cameron Rowland, consisting of a newly commissioned body of work. Cameron Rowland (born 1988, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania) lives and works in New York. Recent solo exhibitions include: D37, Museum of Contemporary Art, Los

Angeles (2018); Rue Ravenstein 32, Etablissement d'en face, Brussels (2017); Birmingham, Galerie Buchholz, Cologne (2017); Indirect Benefit, Kunsthalle Fribourg, Fribourg (2016); 91020000, Artists Space, New York (2016); Bait Inc., Essex Street, New York (2014). Rowland's work was included in the 33rd Bienal de São Paulo, São Paulo (2018) and Whitney Biennial 2017, New York.

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Honey-Suckle Company: Omnibus

Omnibus is the first-ever survey of the work of the Berlin collective Honey-Suckle Company, which brings together key moments of the group's twenty-five-year history.

Founded in 1994, the group emerged out of the post-reunification and pre-Internet cultural and social contexts of Berlin, defined by epochal underground techno and squatting scenes. They identify as a movement, built around an ongoing series of interventions in fashion, music and art.

Stefan Kalmár says: Coinciding with one hundred years of Bauhaus and thirty years since the fall of the Berlin Wall, Honey-Suckle Company's first survey at the ICA is as timely as it is long overdue.

Artists' Moving Image Convening 2019: Image Behaviour 13–17 November 2019

Image Behaviour considers the intersectional possibilities of artists' moving image as a cross-disciplinary artform. Empowering dialogue around the interconnected nature of moving image and its hybrid forms, Image Behaviour includes new commissions and recent works in a series of day and evening sessions comprising projection, performance, music and discussion.

The Artists' Moving Image Convening builds on the output of the former Artists' Film Biennial, which took place at the ICA in 2013, 2015 and 2017. Now taking place annually, the programme continues the ICA's longstanding committment to developing experiments in the medium and pioneering new areas of knowledge exchange.

Unfolding in the ICA Theatre over five days, the convening includes multi-screen projection and live performance in an immersive environment alongside a daily discussion programme. Centring practitioners from varied fields, the programme stakes out the need for new modes of engagement, presentation and discourse to encompass the perceptual, technological and social possibilities that contemporary artists' moving image brings to bear.

A new live commission by Philadelphia-based interdisciplinary artists Black Quantum Futurism, comprising a two-week programme of music, performance, spoken word, talks and workshops set within a new installation in the ICA Lower Gallery.

Black Quantum Futurism is a collaboration between Camae Ayewa (activist, musician and poet Moor Mother) and Rasheedah Phillips (artist, attorney and writer). Their work sits at the intersection of activism, art and speculative fiction writing, and is centred on a radical artistic methodology inspired by Afrofuturism, Afrodiasporan engagements with space and time, and quantum physics.

Black Quantum Futurism have invited artists Barby Asante, D. Denenge Duyst-Akpem, Languid Hands and The Otolith Group, musicians Nkisi and Elaine Mitchener, and feminist activists East End Sisters Uncut to contribute works to the live programme.

Freedom and Friendship is a group exhibition in the ICA Studio exploring voice, political expression and notions of home. The artists featured in the exhibition are students associated with the Islington Centre for Refugees and Migrants who have participated in monthly workshops at the ICA led by a range of artist-facilitators since late 2018. Over the course of screen-printing, banner-making, zine production, oral history and music workshops, the students created a diverse body of artistic output which conveys their personal stories, attachments, convictions and contexts.



3–6 October 2019

Allied Editions returns to Frieze London in 2019, exhibiting limited edition artworks by international artists. Presented by eight of the UK's leading galleries, over 100 artworks are on display and for sale from £100, including new editions, which launch exclusively at Frieze London. Terra 79 interweaves a performance of new music from progressive R&B artist Azekel, poetry by interdisciplinary poet julianknxx and a new installation, *Ent Tropic*, by avant-garde musician GAIKA. Presenting a futurist view of Black cultural production, which blurs the lines between typically segregated genres and disciplines, Terra 79 is an inclusive space activated by performance and community.
