ICA Announces July – September 2025 Programme

The ICA is pleased to share its July – September 2025 programme with highlights that include *Connecting Thin Black Lines 1985 – 2025*, an exhibition revisiting and expanding the legacy of *The Thin Black Line* (1985), as well as announcing details on **Tanoa Sasraku's** new solo exhibition; premieres by filmmakers including **Albert Serra** and **Courtney Stephens**; a live programme featuring collaborations with **CTM and Atonal Festivals**, **Amber Mark** and **Baby Dee**; and the launch of **GLUE**, the ICA's new artist book fair, which brings together over 50 publishers for a weekend of exhibitions, talks and workshops.

The season reflects the ICA's commitment to cross-disciplinarity and artistic experimentation, with a focus on intergenerational exchange, cultural memory and emerging creative practice. This new season brings together a programme of exhibitions, film, live performance and talks, presenting new commissions, premieres, experimental music and discursive events across its spaces.

EXHIBITIONS

Connecting Thin Black Lines 1985 - 2025 (24 June - 7 September 2025)

Spanning the ICA Lower Gallery and Concourse, *Connecting Thin Black Lines* 1985 –2025 brings together new commissions, and recent and historical works from **Brenda Agard, Sutapa Biswas, Sonia Boyce, Chila Kumari Burman, Jennifer Comrie, Lubaina Himid, Claudette Johnson, Ingrid Pollard, Veronica Ryan, Marlene Smith and Maud Sulter.** The exhibition seeks to expand contemporary interpretations and conversations around Himid's groundbreaking 1985 exhibition *The Thin Black Line*, reflecting on shared methodologies and infrastructures of resistance across four decades.

Himid has curated *Connecting Thin Black Lines* 1985 – 2025 as a multi-vocal, multi-disciplinary project, bringing together artists across a range of practices beyond the exhibition, with an expansive public programme across film, performance, readings and live events. Highlights include a variety of screenings and Q&As throughout the three-month programme with **Pratibha Parmar, Helen Cammock, Sutapa Biswas and Amber Akaunu;** a performance evening with the Bermuda poetry collective **Vex'd Bermoothes on 15 July**; and a panel discussion on **27 August** exploring the continued resonance of the original exhibition's strategies. Additional performances in the summer months include *Music and Silence* by **Magda Stawarska and Zeynep Özsuca**, *Signals* with **Trevor Mathison**, **Gary Stewart and Tansy Spinks**, *Tracing The Thin Black Line* by **Rommi Smith with Christella Litras**, *Che si può fare* by **Helen Cammock** and a poetic response in the gallery by **Andra Simons**. The exhibition also extends online with an ICA Instagram takeover by **Tao Lashley-Burnley**. The full schedule of the programme can be found below.

Tanoa Sasraku: Morale Patch (7 October 2025 – 11 January 2026)

A new solo exhibition by **Tanoa Sasraku** opens in the Lower Galleries this autumn. Through process-driven works on paper, found objects, and sculpture, Sasraku examines the seductive and destructive power of oil – its ties to war and national identity – through the mediation of emblems and mementos. A public programme will be announced at a later date.

FILM

The ICA's cinema programme continues to platform bold, international and essayistic filmmaking across its core strands.

Off-Circuit, the programme that offers audiences a chance to encounter this generation's landmark films on screen for the very first time, presents the premieres of **Sammy Baloji's** *The Tree of* Authenticity, **Hong Sangsoo's** *What Does That Nature Say to You?*, **Sofia Bohdanowicz's** *Measures for a Funeral* (concluding her Audrey Benac cycle), **Albert Serra's** *Afternoons of Solitude*, a portrait of Peruvian-born bullfighter **Andrés Roca Rey**, and **Courtney Stephens and Callie Hernandez's** *Invention*.

The Celluloid Sunday Festival (11 – 20 July) marks the conclusion of the ICA's beloved series, celebrating analogue cinema with rare 35mm and 16mm screenings by Edward Yang, Jim Jarmusch, David Cronenberg and more. The programme 'Youths' (24 July – 17 August) gathers films that explore youth, solidarity, and identity through the formation of communities. Other highlights include The Machine That Kills Bad People (22 July), returning with a double bill by Maya Deren and Kira Muratova; In Focus: Serge Daney (29 August–4 September), a ten-film programme exploring the legacy of the influential critic in collaboration with Sabzian.

The ICA also welcomes the return of the **Hong Kong Film Festival** (13 – 28 September).

LIVE

This season's Live programme spans electrifying performance, experimental music and movement workshops. **Amber Mark** opens the summer programme on 3 July, followed by our third collaboration with **CTM Festival** (4 – 6 September) supported by Goethe-Institut London. Spanning three nights, the festival features **emptyset**, **KAVARI**, **Lyra Pramuk**, **aya & MFO**, **Tarta Relena and VMO**.

Further events include performances from **Baby Dee** (2 September), **Atonal's** *Humanities* by Laxlan Petras (23 August), and upcoming appearances from **Ghosted**, a collaboration between Oren Ambarchi, Johan Berthling and Andreas Werliin (16 September), **Gazelle Twin, WOOM** and **The Grubby Mitts**.

The ICA also presents **Resonance**, a three-part workshop series in collaboration with the Finnish Institute in the UK and Ireland (18 – 20 July), exploring collective movement and performance with artists **Teo Ala-Ruona**, **Miša Skalkis and Marika Peura**.

TALKS AND ENGAGEMENT

The ICA's Talks & Engagement programme continues to nurture dialogue across disciplines.

Key summer events include new iterations of the **Speaking Futures** programme in partnership with *AnOther* Magazine. Speaking Futures is a new flagship talks, performance and workshop programme exploring the intersection between art and life and celebrating artists as catalysts for imagining and shaping the future. **Sounding Futures** is the first collaborative performance between Diasporas Now co-founders (RIEKO, Lulu Wang, Paola Estrella) developed as part of the platform's yearlong residency and presented on 9 July, and **WIP: Sharing Space** will travel to 198 CAL in Brixton with a work in progress performance led by RIEKO and ICA Creatives on 22 July. This year's **ICA Creatives x Pesolife** programme culminates in a cross-disciplinary takeover of the theatre space (2 July), a new platform for interdisciplinary practice **PULSE** launches with Biogal on 17 July, and book launches include **Rosanna McLaughlin's** *Against Morality* (22 July) and **Hot Pencil Press'** *Letter to My Little Trans Self* on 30 July.

GLUE, the ICA's new annual artist publishing fair, launches 13 – 14 September with over 50 participating publishers including Verso, Montez Press, Matts Gallery, Antenne and Four Corners. The weekend includes talks, workshops with Toe Press, an open studio with Different Gravy, and exhibitions from Hot Potato and Sana Badri.

In addition, the Talks programme will host the **ICA Youth Forum** over the summer and will respond to *Connecting Thin Black Lines* with a collaborative sound work and listening party, exploring sound as a tool for dialogue and exchange.
