Institute of Contemporary Arts (ICA), London announces its October – December 2025 Programme

This autumn the ICA presents a wide-ranging programme across exhibitions, film, live music and performance, talks and engagement.

In the galleries, **Tanoa Sasraku** debuts a significant new commission, *Morale Patch*, which explores the entanglement of oil, nationalism, and empire through emblems, souvenirs, and the unstable materials of power. The exhibition is accompanied by a rich programme of events, including an in-conversation with Rosalind Nashashibi, a new publication launch, and a curated film series.

The ICA's cinemas host a distinctive season that continues our **Long Takes** strand exploring the work of cinema's great artists, both past and present with **Angela Schanelec** and **Theo Angelopoulos**; introduces **Jean-Luc Godard: Unmade and Abandoned**, and welcomes **Off-Circuit** premieres of new films that have yet to receive a spotlight in the UK, alongside major festivals and artist film programmes.

Live music and performance animate the ICA Stage with international pioneers, cult icons and new voices, with a special **In the Round** series, designed specifically for ICA's unique d&b 360° sound system. Talks & Engagement will foreground new voices and interdisciplinary practice, with a particular focus on publishing,

performance and collective working. This season will feature **PULSE**, a new strand for experimental performance, and launches the next phase of **ICA Creatives** with **Diasporas Now**, alongside book launches, symposia and artist-led events.

Spanning exhibitions, film, live music, talks and more, the ICA's programme runs daily from midday into the night, with the Bar and Café at the heart of the building as spaces to meet, exchange ideas and connect. The season affirms the ICA as one of London's most vital sites for interdisciplinary culture.

EXHIBITIONS

Tanoa Sasraku: Morale Patch 7 October 2025 – 11 January 2026, Lower Gallery

This autumn, the ICA presents a new commission by **Tanoa Sasraku** (b. 1995, Plymouth). *Morale Patch* brings together process-driven works on paper, found objects, and sculptural elements to interrogate the seductive and destructive power of oil, exploring its entanglement with war, national identity, and systems of value. Through the mediation of emblems and mementos, Sasraku reflects on how symbols of pride and service are used to aestheticize – and make palatable – the violence of war, extraction, and domination.

The exhibition is accompanied by a public conversation between **Sasraku** and **artist Rosalind Nashashibi** (4 November). On 26 November the ICA launches the publication *Tanoa Sasraku: Morale Patch*, featuring contributions by Fiona Banner, Chiorstadh Black, Libby Ireland, Pip Laurenson, Andrea Nitsche-Krupp, Susan Schuppli and the artist. A dedicated film programme curated in dialogue with the exhibition runs in Cinema 2, beginning with *There Will Be Blood* (22 October), continuing with *Fahrenheit 9/11* (19 November), *Lessons of Darkness* (20 December), and concluding with *Jarhead* (7 January 2026).

Forthcoming: Laura Lima 27 January – 29 March 2026, Upper and Lower Galleries

Looking ahead, the ICA will stage an expansive solo exhibition by Brazilian artist **Laura Lima** (b. 1971). This long-overdue UK debut spans both the Upper and Lower Galleries and introduces two new performative installations that blur the boundaries between audience, sculpture and performance.

FILM

Long Takes

Long Takes continues this autumn with the conclusion of **Being in Time: The**Cinema of Angela Schanelec, this major retrospective comes to a close with a rare in-depth conversation with the German filmmaker. From 23 October – 30

November, Long Takes turns to Greek director Theo Angelopoulos with A Moving Image of Eternity, a survey of films that span nearly five decades and unfold as epic journeys through myth and history.

Off-Circuit

Off-Circuit, the ICA's ongoing platform for formally radical and underseen contemporary cinema, features a series of UK premieres this autumn. On **24 October**, the ICA presents **Rhayne Vermette's Levers**, a haunting portrait of a Manitoba community thrown into disarray after an explosion causes a blackout, followed by a Q&A with the director. Further Off-Circuit highlights include **Igor Bezinovic's** Tiger Award-winning *Fiume o Morte!* (from 21 November), which boldly marries archival material, reconstruction and fiction to explore the history of a city and its people, and the UK premiere of **Pedro Pinho's I Only Rest in the Storm** (from 5 December), a mesmeric odyssey set in Guinea-Bissau, which is accompanied by an In Focus programme on Pinho's work from 28 November to 14 December.

Jean-Luc Godard: Unmade and Abandoned

From 25 November, the ICA presents Jean-Luc Godard: Unmade and Abandoned, a new programme curated by Michael Witt that brings to light the legendary filmmaker's unrealised and unfinished projects. This series reveals the hidden connections between Godard's phantom works, his completed films and those of other directors. The programme opens with the world premiere of *The Wild Palms* (25 November), which interweaves *Made in USA* and *Two or Three Things I Know About Her* into a new cinematic work inspired by William Faulkner's novel. Further screenings include *Literary Adaptation I: Godard and Guy de Maupassant* (9 December), which explores Godard's engagement with Maupassant, including the unmade projects that fed into *Masculin féminin*.

Alongside these three strands, the season also features the return of the **BFI** London Film Festival (8 – 19 October), the annual Frieze Film × ICA Artists' Film Programme (Upper Galleries 13 – 19 October), also available to watch online until 31 October, the London Korean Film Festival (6 – 15 November) and the London Palestine Film Festival (16 – 28 November). The ICA also presents focused

retrospectives dedicated to the work of both Japanese filmmaker **Kaori Oda** (20 – 23 November), and French director **Luc Moullet** (2 – 6 December).

Special events include a screening of **David Lynch's** *Mulholland Drive* with a conversation between Philippa Snow and Emily LaBarge (7 October), the London Premiere of **Charlie Shackleton's** *Zodiac Killer Project* (15 November), and **Mark Cousins'** *A Sudden Glimpse to Deeper Things* (8 November), presented in collaboration with the British Academy.

LIVE

The season begins with Kara-Lis Coverdale (1 October), who composes and performs works across acoustic and electronic mediums to create sound worlds that transcend reality, and Famous (2 October), whose idiosyncratic and sardonic sound has made them one of the most exciting acts on London's underground circuit, but who will also be performing their final show after recent announcement of a long-term hiatus. On 4 October, Oblique_Futures and Diagonal Records present a night of radical electronic and computer music featuring Powell, Florian Hecker & Marcin Pietruszewski, Regis & Russell Haswell and Lupini. The following evening the ICA hosts an immersive playback of Sigur Rós' Takk... (5 October), to celebrate the record's 20th anniversary, remixed from the original multitrack in full spatial audio.

In the Round

A central focus of this season is the ICA's In the Round series, presented on the venue's cutting-edge d&b Soundscape system. These concerts are designed specifically for spatial performance, enveloping audiences in 360° sound. October features five in-the-round performances: milkweed (15 October) with their slacker-trad duo of voice, guitar and banjo; The Art of This (18 October), a descendant of electronic pioneers Art of Noise, combining words, music and images; Holden & Zimpel (23 October) exploring minimalist clarinet and synth textures; Mermaid Chunky (25 October) with their danceable, costume-rich improvisations; and Titanic (29 October), the chamber-jazz-meets-art-pop project of Mabe Fratti and I La Catolica. Together these performances highlight the ICA as a site for experimentation with spatialised sound.

In November the ICA welcomes **Seefeel** with **James Massiah** (1 November), **BIG|BRAVE** with **Sealionwoman** (2 November) and **Phew** (4 November), joined by poet and rapper **Isaiah Hull** and **Freddie Murphy.** The following night **Nabeel** (5 November) bring their blend of indie shoegaze and Arabic influences, while

the **Pitchfork Festival** (6 November) features **Los Thuthanaka**, **Nazar** and **pollyfromthedirt**. Multi-disciplinary outfit **Sorry** (7 November) return to launch their new album *COSPLAY*, featuring some of the band's most beautiful songwriting to date.

Later in the month, Detroit post-punk band **Protomartyr** perform two nights (12 – 13 November), **Joanne Robertson** with **Raisa K** (14 November) present an evening of intimate performance. As part of the EFG London Jazz Festival, **Sarathy Korwar Drum Ensemble** (15 November) and **Theon Cross** with **III Considered** (18 November) take the stage. **Opera Omnia: Space Afrika × Valentin Noujaïm** (20 November) merges surreal cinema and live score, while **Cabaret Voltaire** (21 November) mark 50 years of live performance. The month concludes with **Craven Faults** (22 November), **Baby Dee** with **Jacken Elswyth** (25 November) and **An Evening with Lou Barlow** (26 November), founding member of Sebadoh, Dinosaur Jr. and The Folk Implosion.

December opens with two nights from James K (3 – 4 December), followed by Danish producer and curator **Courtesy** (6 December) who presents the UK premiere of *Against Interpretation Club*, combining a lineup of DJs, art and music performances. Later in the month genre-defying songwriter **Oscar Jerome** (10 December) presents a stripped back version of his acclaimed record *The Fork* with **Lucinda Chua** and **Raven Bush** from Speaker's Corner Quartet, and **Snapped Ankles** (13 December) perform twice in a day with their frenetic, movement-driven live show.

TALKS & ENGAGEMENT

The season opens with the book launch and screening of Liz Johnson Artur's I Will Keep You in Good Company (1 October). The acclaimed photographer is joined by designer Martine Rose for an evening of film and conversation to mark the release of her new publication. Later in the month, Stephanie LaCava launches her novel Nymph (22 October), accompanied by the debut UK performance of experimental metal project Demsyl, and Diasporas Now x Speaking Futures host a discussion on Artist Collectives (29 October) with Nana Opoku of The Feminist Library, the interdisciplinary design collective RESOLVE and Black Obsidian Sound System (B.O.S.S.).

PULSE

PULSE is a new ICA strand for experimental performance that responds directly to urgent social and cultural questions. The series begins with **Biogal's** *I Feel*

Very Attacked! (9 October), a site-adaptive live-art assemblage that explores the convergence of queer identity politics with global politics in contemporary art spaces, asking how art can play its part in the struggle for freedom.

ICA Creatives × Diasporas Now

The ICA's core young artists programme also launches a new phase this season with ICA Creatives × Diasporas Now: Term 1 with RIEKO (27 September – 6 December). Offering free artist-led workshops for 16–30 year-olds, the 2025/26 edition adopts a multidisciplinary, genre-fluid approach to creativity. The first term, led by Diasporas Now member RIEKO, explores writing as both a creative practice and a practical tool for artists working across disciplines.

Additional highlights include the **Conditions Studio Programme screening** (3 October), showcasing new work by artists on the Conditions residency; **ICA Creatives reading group** (20 November) led by **Ishy Pryce-Parchment** to accompany the *Tanoa Sasraku: Morale Patch* exhibition; and further events with **Speaking Futures × Diasporas Now**, including **WIP: Sharing Space** (November) and **Bullyache × Diasporas Now** (December).
